What: Block of the Month Workday for Comfort Quilts

Why: 1) make comfort quilt tops, 2) learn new skills and techniques, 3) socialize

When: First Friday of each month (10/4, 11/1 and 12/6) 10 am to 4 pm

Where: Malaga Fire Department (go past the Malaga Store, look for the fire truck sign)

Who: Any and all are welcome

Bring your lunch and beverages, basic sewing needs/tools, your machine, fabric if you want to donate it. Ironing and cutting stations will be provided. Please do not go out and buy fabric for these workdays. The goal is to use scraps. Some fabrics will be provided if your don't have scraps to use (Is there such a thing?). Plan to make as many blocks as you want. Everyone's blocks will be combined-24-35 blocks needed to make a top.

This month's block is a string-pieced block, 11" square, set diagonally in half square triangles. It is a super colorful quilt and will use a bunch of scraps.

Thank you everyone for your time, talent and material to make Comfort Quilts for our community. We have received 207 quilts as of the beginning of September. We have delivered 149 quilts and many baby flannel and fleece blankets, place mats, pillowcases, 3 raffle quilts and 5 twin fleece blankets for CASA. We have given to Confluence Health Palliative Care, Oncology/Radiation, Newborn and Pediatrics. Women's Resource, the Bunker, Mobile Meals, Cancer Care House, Grace House, Leavenworth Rehab, Mt. View Women's Clinic (formally Real Options), recent house-fire victims.

We have a nice selection of men's lap quilts to give to our Vets in November for Veteran's Day. Thank you everyone!

Help Save The Songbirds By Reducing Lights at Night to Help Migrating Birds

Every spring and fall, billions of birds migrate through North America, mostly under the cover of darkness. Unfortunately, they face an increasing threat: unnatural, man-made light.

Light attracts and disorients migrating birds making them vulnerable to collisions with buildings. The solution is as simple as flipping the switch. Turning off lights dramatically reduces hazards and allows birds to safely proceed with their migratory journeys.

There are growing international "Lights Out" efforts already underway. Lights Out does more than save birds; it saves energy and money! The US Environmental Protection Agency highlights energy as the largest operating expense for commercial buildings. Fall migration is underway now through December. Here are some ways you can keep the skies darker at night and help birds stay out of harms way:

- Turn off non-essential lights from 11 PM until 6 AM during critical migration periods.
- Turn off or dim lobby and atrium lights.
- Turn off or dim interior home lighting or draw blinds to prevent light escaping.
- Turn off decorative landscape lighting.
- Turn off lights before leaving the home or office.
- Be sure outside lights are aimed down and well shielded.
- Install motion sensors on outside lights to minimize use.

Guide Dog Presentation information: Barb Dunn and guest Pascal (sorry if you missed him-he is super cute!)

Quilt Guild mtg highlight – Guide Dogs for the Blind (SCRAPS) Sept 2024
This is 14 month old Pascal, the oldest pup in the our local Guide Dogs for the Blind puppy raising club.

Guide Dogs for the Blind was started in 1942 to answer a need for servicemen coming home from the war having lost their sight. Dogs are trained to safely guide individuals around obstacles, in traffic, on stairs and through tripping hazards. They work in all types of weather, navigating city sidewalks, country roads or hiking through the woods. The guide dog is more than a set of eyes, but also a companion, exercise buddy, confidence builder and a means to more freedom and inclusion in society. They are life changers, and sometimes a life saver.

A guide dog for a legally blind person is the most elite of the service dogs. Only about 45% successfully become a guide. They must learn obedience, house manners, self-control, and how to behave on transportation, in restaurants, school, work, shops etc. Their training is done by the puppy raiser from 8 weeks of age to about 15 months. If successful, the pup will then go to formal guide work training by a professional at 2 out-of-state locations. If the dog passes all 8 levels, they are paired with their matched person for 2 weeks of partner-skills and then graduation.

Should a dog be unable to complete this rigorous training, they may then become a K-9 buddy for a blind child, be a hearing alert dog, mobility dog, diabetic alert, seizure alert, or help those with autism or PTSD.

This service is provided at 100% no cost to the client, including transportation and veterinary assistance.

Our local club, started in late 2011, is all volunteers. Fundraising pays for food, toys, training equipment, and a yearly statewide training day. Barb has raised 12 puppies (10 have gone on to formal training) and is the current club leader for the past 10 years.

Thank you Barb, Pascal, and your wonderful team of volunteers.

What does this have to do with Comfort Quilts? Scraps, of which we all have, for dog beds.

After you have given to Fabrics and More, our other quilters who love using scraps, and anyone else, you can bag up what's left of your fabric and batting and bring them to a meeting and give them to Comfort Quilts. Instead of ending up in the landfill they can end up helping a person.

Quilt Labeling, the 5 W's"

<u>What:</u> All quilts. Quilts are an expression of our artistic style and viewpoint at any given time in history. They capture a moment in time as we change and grow. Our emotion, thoughts, dreams, sorrows, loves and hopes are stitched into every quilt. No one knows this unless you share it verbally or better yet, on your label.

A label can be as simple as – the name of the maker; the date of completion (can include the start date). It can be more extensive to include:

- the location of the quiltmaker
- the occasion for the making of the quilter
- the recipient's name, date of birth, date of occasion being commemorated
- the story and thoughts that went into the quilter
- · the fabric choices
- the names of other participants
- the pattern used and the pattern designer's name

The choice is up to you. If it is guilted by another artist, credit should be included on the label.

<u>Where:</u> Anywhere on your quilt; your choice. A quilt label can be a separate piece of fabric with written information on it or embroidery by hand or machine. It can be any size and can also incorporate photos, painting, fabric pens, applique, etc. If it is a fabric label, it should be put on before the quilting and be quilted over to ensure it is not removed when stolen, lost or with aging. It can be machine sewn onto the backing or and appliqued onto the backing. I prefer to sew two edges into the binding and applique the other two edges down, that way it is very secure.

Other methods of labeling include embroidery or writing on the binding; writing directly onto the quilt back or front (this is my favorite way to label; it is like signing a painting); using a preprinted label or printing your own with your ink jet printer and applying it to your quilt. Whatever method you choose, it should be permanent. Follow the instructions included with the pens, ink jet ink, etc.

<u>Who:</u> The Maker, artist, quilter. Each quilt is our workmanship and should be sent into the world with it's credentials. It is not bragging or being an impostor to label your quilt. No matter if it is an original design or a purchased pattern, you put it all together and saw it through to the end result.

<u>When:</u> Upon completion of the quilt. Anytime during the quilt-making process, a label can be made. If you find this final detail to be tedious, I suggest you make the label first and fill in the details as you go. That way it will be done or close to done when you are ready to apply it.

<u>Why:</u> So many reasons! As time marches forward, our verbal stories get lost, peoples memories fade and quilt-makers are forgotten. Quilts are found in attics, in grandmother's possessions when she passes, at garage and estate sales and with no label the precious history of the quilts are lost.

As an example, I was given two quilts by my father who said they were made by his mother. One is a crazy pieced summer quilt-no batting, no embellishments, no color plan. The other is a beautiful appliqued floral wreath-blocks quilt with intricate embroidery, all solid fabric and hand quilted. As a quilter, I know our styles change and we try new things but these quilts have no documentation and I can't believe they would have been made by the same person. Without a label I will never know.

If you plan on entering your work into quilt shows or exhibits, a permanent label is very important. Artworks have been lost or stolen, so a label shouldn't be slapped on right before submitting to a show. It should be an integral part of the quilt. In this case, a phone number is also a good idea. In my view, there is never too much info on a label.

Editor's note: Next time you're looking at quilts in a show or maybe show and tell, check out the labels. Jill provided photos of some of her labels, but they wouldn't transfer to the newsletter.
