



"Elements of 30" Theme- #4.00

The Challenge is on! 2014 will be the NCW Zuilt Guild's 30th Anniversary. In the spirit of honoring the Guild, we have 2 colors of Pearlessence fabric for the 2014 Harvest of Zuilts Challenge. Each has a design with a pearly shimmering effect-pearl being the traditional gift for a 30th Anniversary. The challenge is open-anything you like: applique, embroidery, piecing, beading, etc. But, in your description you must explain what your "30" is. It could be 30 blocks, 30 flower petals, 30 pieces of fabric, etc. Just explain it! Let's have fun! Pick up your kit at the next Guild meeting.



[During the September Guild program Jan Davies showed us wonderful thread work she was using in her quilting. I asked her to explain one of the techniques for "Moss".]

The Technique is called the **Moss stitch**. You can find the instructions for this and a lot of other embellishing in the book <u>"Threads, the Basics and Beyond"</u> by Debbie Bates and Liz Kettle.

Moss Stitch instructions: Set your machine to free motion with the dog feeds down. Loosen the bobbin tension and tighten the upper tension. The tighter the top the bigger the loop you will have being pulled up from the bobbin. Needle 90/14, top thread water soluble or polyester thread in contrasting color to bobbin. Bobbin thread, any decorative thread.

Cut a piece of fabric and tear-away stabilizer large enough to fit into a machine embroidery hoop. Using the hoop assists to control fabric distortion while creating the loops. Draw a shape on the fabric and place the fabric and stabilizer in the hoop. Begin stitching in a small circular motion or change directions often. This brings the thread to the top. Continue the circular motion until you have the density of loops you want. Remove the fabric from the hoop and turn it over. Fuse a piece of muslin to the back of the design. Turn back over and remove the top thread from the loops with a seam ripper or dissolve in water if using a water soluble thread.

If the upper thread begins to break, loosen the top tension a bit and loosen the bobbin tension a little more. Don't be afraid to play with your tension because this is what helps create different thread affects. Always use a practice piece to get the tension correct before starting on a project. ~Jan Davies





A Taste of Quilting in Misawa, Japan

When I applied to be part of the Sister City Delegation to travel to Misawa, Japan, in August 2013, I had an ulterior motive. I hoped I would be able to connect with at least one Japanese quilter and maybe have the privilege of visiting her sewing studio. The rest of the trip was a big bonus; a whirl wind of tourist attractions, subways, bullet trains, natural hot springs bathing pools, Air Force base tours, cultural experiences galore and more sushi and raw fish than I ever thought I would eat, but I did!

I had attempted to contact some Japanese quilters before I left but kept reaching dead ends, so as I departed from the states I had no plans or avenues to accomplish my goal. But as my "free" day approached, my host family told me that they too, had been unable to make any connections with local quilters. They said we would visit a local Loom Rental Warehouse and a Vintage Kimono store that also served the most beautiful Bento Box lunch I have ever seen.


Then at the last minute a local "Patchwork" Store owner called my host wife, Reini (pronounced Lady), and told her she was holding a casual class at her shop and I was welcome to visit. I think they did not understand why I would be interested to see their work and space. They are very humble with a competitive edge. But I jumped at the chance. I took the photo book I had made for my host family which included some family photos and lots of pictures of my quilts. I was only able to bring a very small project of English Paper Piecing Hexagons to share, but they seemed genuinely interesting in my meager accomplishments.

I cannot describe in short terms the simple, understated, elegant beauty of the shop and their quilts! Five women warmly welcomed me into their gathering and for two hours with very little English spoken we had the Show and Tell of the year. Each gal had 3-4 quilts to share (they had a "heads up" that I was coming) and each one rivaled the last. All of their quilts were completely hand constructed and no detail was left out. I was inspired to think beyond just finishing. The embellishing I saw was the frosting on the cake, though the quilt would have been complete without it, but they just went that extra mile. Patience and excellence were in abundance.

That day, my dreams came true. I met Japanese quilters; we spoke the language of quilts together, shared our love of the craft with no judgment and left with new ideas and inspiration. This precious art form of our's is so universal I could have spent the day with no need for words.

Monroe Quilt Show Trip

Date: Saturday, March 15, 2014

Times: Bus departs JC Penney lot <u>promptly</u> at 7:00 a.m. Bus leaves Monroe <u>promptly</u> at 4:00 p.m. and arrives back in Wenatchee at approximately 6:30 p.m.

Cost: \$40 includes entrance fee for the show, a morning snack on the bus and bottled water.

Itinerary:

- · Arrive at the show by 10:00 a.m. (We'll stop at a rest stop along the way for leg stretching.)
- · Explore the show, visit the vendors
- \cdot On your own for lunch at the show; they have a nice choice of salads and sandwiches
- · Board the bus for our return trip at 4:00 p.m. (We'll stop at a rest stop again for leg stretching.) We will not make a dinner stop, so bring a snack if you think you can't make it home without eating.

Payment in full due at the time reservation is made. 50% refund up to 45 days prior to the event. Within the 45-day window, a refund is only available if we are able to fill your seat. No refund 14 days before the event.

This trip is a benefit of Guild membership and is therefore open only to Guild members. If there are still seats available 2 weeks before the trip, sign-up will be opened to non-members. This is a Kid Free Zone.

Dear Quilt Guild Members.

I can't thank you enough for your kind generosity and gifts of the spirit that you bring to our palliative care patients. To see them light up when they are given the quilt and then humbly and quietly say, "Is this for me?" They are literally overwhelmed and I am forever grateful to all of you. It is also a gift for me as it is a time when we don't have to talk so seriously about their illness but rather demonstrate kindness and compassion through the work of talented hands.

The past two days, I have been meeting with a 63 year old lady who was working locally up until two weeks ago. While at work, she experienced some numbness in her right arm. Soon after, she also had severe abdominal pain and had to have emergency surgery for a bowel obstruction and now has a permanent ostomy. On top of all of this, she found to have metastatic lung cancer to the brain and that was the cause of her arm being numb. As you can only imagine how distraught and overwhelm she is and how her head is just spinning with the news. She kept saying yesterday, "I just have to find a little light to get me through each day, but right now I just can't." When I presented her one of your quilts, I gave her a hug and quietly whispered in her ear and said, "maybe today this is your little bit of light to get you through today." Many tears easily flowed and a smile crept across her sullen face. She was so very grateful. Your quilts bring a sense of security when life feels and is very chaotic for a person.

Enclosed is also a personal thank you from patient, I believe.

Fire Proofing Quilts for Public Spaces

For five years now I have been working at Cascade Medical Center in Leavenworth, and I have been allowed to hang quilts in various departments. The staff lunch room and the Nursing staff break room, restrooms, Mammography department, Housekeeing, the ER waiting room all have/had quilts grace the walls. After a recent fire inspection I learned about the Life Safety Code 10.2.4 regarding Textile Wall and Ceiling Materials. Quilts hanging in a Hospital hallway or Public area must be Fire Proofed. I found an approved Fire Retardant at www.dharmatrading.com called Safe-T-Guard. I decided to test this product on a quilt that hangs in the ER waiting room Fern View 50"x60". I bought a quart spray



bottle (\$23.56) and used about two cups of the retardant, spraying both sides, (outside on a calm, dry day.) Safe-T-guard is only good on natural fibers, dries clear and I couldn't detect an odor. Those of you who volunteer at quilt shows to help fold curtains will recognize the feeling you get after handling fire proofed fabric. I always wondered what that chemical was. Unfortunately the MSDS sheet does not say the ingredients. The only health hazards listed are if you ingest the product. The product is waterbased so the textiles should be dry cleaned (up to 3 times). I recommend

Safe-T-Guard if you're hanging quilts. Just be careful with art quilts that contain synthetics or markers-test the product first. I love to see quilts hanging in public places, but there have been serious life threatening fires in hospitals and nursing homes, and this has prompted such strict regulation. Let's keep everyone safe.
