History of Sun Bonnet Sue Patterns

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
Quilt Walk Memorial Park

Panguitch, Utah

If it wasn't for an innovative use of quilts during a crisis, the city of Panguitch might not exist today.









Two rescue parties we sent out to seek food supplies from other "nearby" rural communities in Utah. One party attempted to travel 110 miles north to Gunnison, while the other would have to trek 40 miles west over the mountains to Parowan. The group traveling north were quickly impeded by harsh weather conditions and had to turn back. Meanwhile, the 7 rescuers who trekked west over the mountains eventually had to give up their oxen team and wagon to travel through deep drifts of snow on foot.

As they were struggling, the rescuers stopped to pray for guidance. While doing so they knelt on the quilts and blankets that had been provided for warmth. As they did this, the group realized they were not sinking into the snow while kneeling. This gave them the idea of using their supply of quilts and blankets as a way to travel across the snowfields on foot without exhausting themselves. Essentially, the quilts became snowshoes. The rescue party was able to secure enough food and provisions to supply the town for the rest of winter and deliver it safely back home.

Since 1998, this heroic event is celebrated and remembered in Panguitch with an annual Quilt Walk Festival on the second week of June. Preceding each year's festival, colorful quilts are displayed throughout town. More recently, a memorial and small park were completed and dedicated to the 7-member rescue party who successfully made this trek.

The park contains an impressive memorial statue, plantings, seven benches dedicated to each member of the rescue team, as well as inscriptions on the life story of each person.





Background for the pattern on the left is ¾ yard. If you want to use one of the featured fabrics for a border you will need at least ½ yard more. If you have a big splashy print that you love but think don't have enough... bring it and we will get creative........

The quilt studio is starting again. The first one will be how to make small design boards, taught by Diane Garlini. See supply list. You do not need to sign up $\sim \sim$ just show up if you are interested.



If you want to make or learn how to make a design board, come to our Quilt Studio for a fun project. We will have supplies on hand (Spray Adhesive, iron and ironing board, glue gun, and sewing machine to use).

Supply List: Foam board 10" x 10" (you can purchase a board that is 20" x 30", then cut up to make six boards) We'll have boards ready to purchase for \$0.50 each 10" x 10" of batting or fusible fleece, Spray Adhesive (if using batting), 1 strip of fabric 2-1/2" x 42", Glue gun, Sewing machine that sew zig zag & matching thread.

Recap from "What I've learned" program:

I was asked to put together a list of the ideas/tools shared during the April meeting. If it says "quilting" on it, it is usually more expensive, so if we can use non-quilting tools for quilting, we can perhaps have more money for the real fun stuff. Hardware and automotive shops can be a quilters best friend-take tour sometime and come up with more clever ideas. So here are a few items that were brought up in April.

Tools/tricks

- Pool noodles. Great for rolling quilts up on. Wrap the rolled quilts in a sheet and store under the bed for a safe, clean storage place.
- Automotive magnetic holders. Small metal dishes with magnets to hold pins, bobbins, other small metal easily lost items. Available at automotive shops or Harbor Freight.
- Tiny tools. Small handled screw drivers or wrenches can be a lifesaver if you need to take your machine apart in an emergency. Stash them in your car for retreats. You just never know when you'll need them. Available at hardware or automotive stores.
- Magnet on a stick. This is a building site tool used to collect nails. A strong magnet on a 3 foot stick makes picking up dropped needles or pins a cinch. Available at hardware stores. Paint it a pretty color so it doesn't end up in the shop or garage.



Recap from "What I've learned" Program: Continued

- Head lamps for spot lighting. Battery powered strap-on lights are great for places where the lighting just isn't strong enough. We found ours at Hooked on Toys in the fishing dept. Much less expensive boy-toy than in a quilt shop. We paid less than \$20.
- Plastic cutting boards for templates. Available at the dollar store. Easily cut with scissors. Not for use with a rotary cutter.
- Dish drying pad for pad under sewing machine. Makes sliding your machine around a bit easier and muffles sound. Also can use as a pin cushion in a pinch. Available at dollar stores.
- Press-N-Seal plastic wrap. Draw patterns or letters on plastic, sew through it and rip it off. Super cool, but don't over stitch it. Be sure to use the lightest colored pen possible when drawing-the ink can show up on the thread.
- Freezer paper for use in designing or applique. Can be sewn through, but not reused.
- Stir-stick or skewer with pipe cleaner taped to the end to clean out machine. Great to have multiple ones on hand.
- Use a bamboo skewer to help hold small pieces in place while sewing. Cheap.
- Check your sandwiched batting, quilt top and backing for light transfer. You may want to underline or change the backing if you want an opaque quilt.
- Accuracy in measuring and cutting is imperative for accurate blocks and matching points. Take the time to measure properly.
- Mark an index card with the machine type, foot used and measurement of seam allowance so if you have to switch machines, you will be able to match the allowance accurately.
- Be consistent.
- Use appropriate tools i.e. machine feet. Invest in a walking foot, open toe embroidery foot, quarter inch foot.
- Keep a selection of needles (machine or hand) in different sizes/styles and know what's for what.

Storage solutions:

- Multi-drawer cabinets (for nuts and bolts) for small items easily lost. Available at hardware stores (and lots of thrift shops-just make sure to wash carefully).
- Hanging shoe rack. One that hangs behind the door and is made of pockets can hold multiple small stashes of items in easy to see pockets.
- Weekly pill container makes a nice travel kit for retreats.

Sanity savers:

- If something isn't working, put it away for a while. Perhaps a break (even months) will give you a different perspective
- Don't be afraid of challenging the design (use different color ways or patterns) to make it your own
- Switch projects with a sewing partner to give new life to a project

Ask questions-that's one of the joys and benefits of belonging to a group of like-interested people. Someone has had the same question before.

1 graham cracker pie shell


Filling




